Our members and allies got this going at 8:30 AM and were finished loading over 400 bags by 10:00 AM. And that included a well-deserved, but short Dunkin break and some fun.





How amazing to have members from the Ridgewood 3-2-1 and QW PRIDE Club working side by side to complete the Backpack Giveaway Service Project. In total, along with their Community Partner, the GRYC, over 3,000 Backpacks will be given to students for the upcoming 2023-2024 School Year. Many hands make light work, congratulations!!

There was a TOY MUSEUM in Vermont and I saw these two items and smiled.



Well, it's that time of year when the <u>Dues are Due</u>. Let me start by clarifying the types of Dues that we have at the Ridgewood 3-2-1 Club.

Individual Member Dues: This is for Individual members who come into the club for \$125.

Business Member Dues: This is a small local business that comes into the club for \$250.

Mid – Corporate Member Dues: This is for a local business or institution that joins for \$1,250.

Corporate Member Dues: This is for a large business or establishment that joins for \$2,500.

Now let's get a better understanding of what each means.

- If you are an Individual from the community or just a person who wants to get involved with Kiwanis to do service for the community, this is the level that you want to join our club.
- If you are a Business in the community and want to join as a Business with more than one possible member, then this is the level that you want to join.
- If you are a Mid-sized Corporation or institution with more employees and want to help to sponsor service projects and help in a bigger way, then this is the level that you would join at.
- If you are a larger Corporation, that comes into Kiwanis to sponsor BIG events and things that allow us to maximize their contribution without hammering our members with too many fundraisers during the year, you are awesome. Corporate Sponsors are really helpful and are the lifeblood to some things like the Backpack Giveaways, Pride Day, Ethnic Days, Blessing Bags and so much more that we do.

Although many Kiwanis Members ask what, exactly, is it that we get for our dues, the answers could vary from person to person, from club to club, and beyond, about the benefits of being a member of Kiwanis. From this Editor's perspective, the biggest benefit is Insurance Coverage for events and other activities that we all participate in. All the rest is fluff, with members forming their own opinions of International Travel Costs, Dinner Costs, Kiwanis Apparel Costs, and the list goes on and on. In addition we get emails from Kiwanis International and plenty of requests for things. If we are to be truthful, Ridgewood 3-2-1 paid or sponsored over \$14,000 in dues, this year, that would have gone a long way to serve others in need.

And then there are dues/fees for Service Leadership Programs like Builders Clubs, K-Kids, Key Clubs, Aktion Clubs and for 3-2-1, our Kiddy Kidz Club. Last year it cost us \$4,000 to sponsor 11 Builders and 6 K-Kids and, as mentioned earlier, this year we will go it on our own and conduct our Service Projects with our GRYC partner sites, using GRYC staff and members to achieve great things. All of our partnerships & collaborations are service focused and accomplish incredible results by sharing costs, responsibilities and project tasks. Although history has shown that more is achieved by working together for the common good of Kiwanis, there is an underlying parochialism and mean spiritedness among some leaders and clubs that are becoming the "NEW CULTURE" of an organization that I have been a member of for 40 YEARS. Enough said, but SAD!

After all, change isn't the same thing as progress.
